Profile LAN Upgrade Installation

Introduction

This product modification kit provides a Local Area Network (LAN) interface card for the PDR 100 or PDR200.

NOTE: You must have Profile System Software version 1.4.X or higher installed to correctly install and configure this LAN card

Please read and follow these instructions in the order given.

Kit Contents

- One LAN card
- One EMI suppression gasket
- One rear panel LAN sticker
- These installation instructions

Pre-Installation Instructions

1. If your Profile is already powered down, skip to Step 2, otherwise perform normal shut down procedures and then power down your Profile and wait a few seconds.
2. Power up the Profile and press and hold the **SHIFT** key. (This interrupts the automatic login feature.)
3. Log in as **administrator** (password **triton**).
4. Open the Windows NT File Manager.
5. If you're using Profile System Software version 1.4.X, insert the *SMC LAN Support files* diskette in drive A and run *a:\update.bat* to update your networking software.
6. Locate and run the **c:\profile\netenabl.bat** file. (This batch file will enable some NT services required to use the LAN card.)
7. After the file has been run, power down the Profile.



Installation Instructions

NOTE: Product upgrades and repairs should only be attempted by qualified service personnel. For further assistance call your nearest Grass Valley Group Service Center.

Label cabling connections prior to removal to facilitate reassembly.

Remove the Profile from the Instrument Rack

1. Remove all cabling connected to the system.
2. Loosen the front-panel retaining screws.
3. Grasp the handles and pull the product out until the slide sections latch. The system is firmly held in this position.
4. Press both track stop latch buttons (visible in the stop latch holes) and carefully slide the system free of the tracks.

CAUTION. Many components in this product are susceptible to static-discharge damage. Service the product only in a static-free environment while observing standard handling precautions for static-sensitive devices. Always wear grounded wrist and foot straps.

Remove the Product Covers




Figure 1. PDR100 Showing Attaching Screws for the Top Covers

1. Using a driver with a #10 Torx tip, remove the flat-head screws that hold down the top covers. See Figure 1.

NOTE: The illustration shows the location of PDR100 top cover screws. The PDR200 top cover screw are in slightly different locations, and include a row of screws securing the media drives to the cover. These screws must be removed to remove the cover from the PDR200.

2. Set aside the covers.

Install the LAN Circuit Card

1. Remove the circuit card panel (bracket) that covers the rear panel slot for J3. Be sure to remove the screws from the top and the bottom of the bracket.
2. Skip to step 6 if slot J3 is vacant and you are not installing any additional options at this time.

NOTE: *If slot J3 is currently occupied by another card, you must remove the short and tall circuit card supports (if present) and move the card to another slot.*

3. Remove the screw that attaches the tall circuit card retainer to the left side of the chassis and pull the retainer straight up.




Figure 2. Retainer For Tall Circuit Cards

4. Remove the retainer for the short circuit cards. Remove the attaching screw located in the middle of the retainer. Lift the retainer straight out.





Figure 3. Retainer for Short Circuit Cards

CAUTION. Do not exert any force on the rear panel-connectors when removing or installing circuit cards in the card slots. Except for the LAN card, two screws hold each circuit card in the card slot, one accessible from the top of the card and the other accessible from the rear of the card. Both screws must be removed before the card can be removed from the product.

5. Slide the LAN card down into slot J3. Some resistance will be exerted by the contact pressure of the connectors. Take care not to exert extreme force to seat the circuit card.

Reassembly

1. Install any additional Options (PDR0FXX) at this time. Use the procedures provided with the PDR0FXX kit.
2. Install the Torx mounting screw in the top of the circuit card panel (bracket).
3. If it was necessary to change the location of any of the short circuit cards (to accommodate the selected location of the new circuit cards), rearrange the individual ECB hold-downs for the short circuit cards to coincide with the new locations. Install the retainer for the short circuit cards.
4. Install the retainer for the tall circuit cards.
5. Install the circuit card cover and disk drive cover. Install and tighten the attaching screws.
6. Install the Profile system in the instrument rack.
7. Install the appropriate cabling to the rear panel connectors of the Profile system.

Configuration

1. Power up the Profile system. Press **F1** or **ENTER** to accept the Services error message.
2. Open the PDR Debug Applications.
3. Double click on the **Load CMOS** icon in the PDR Debug Applications group. Note that the Processor is listed with the SMC LAN card.
4. Reboot the Profile and log in as administrator. Accept the Services error messages during startup.
5. Open the Control Panel, and double click on the **Network** icon.
6. In the list of Installed Adapter cards, highlight the **Intel Ether Express 16LAN Adapter** and click on the **Remove** button. Accept the error message that appears.
7. Click on the **Add Adapter** button, select **Other** (at the end of the list), and then click **Continue**.
8. When prompted for the directory, type **c:\profile\drivers\smc** and press **RETURN**.
9. Select **OK** at the **Select OEM Option** prompt.
10. When prompted, choose **10Mb/s** and select **OK**.
11. You will next return to the Network dialog box. Click **OK**.
12. You will next be prompted for TCP/IP configuration. Proceed to *Configuring the Ethernet card for TCP/IP*.



Configuring the Ethernet Card for TCP/IP

NOTE: *If you are connecting to an existing TCP/IP network, you must contact your network administrator before proceeding with TCP/IP configuration. Please review this procedure and the Configuring Fibre Channel for an Existing Net procedure with your network administrator before performing either procedure.*

The following steps assume that you are **NOT** connecting to an **existing** TCP/IP network.

1. Bring up the TCP/IP configuration dialog.
2. You will need to fill in two fields in the TCP/IP dialog, IP Network Address and Subnet Mask. For the IP Network Address, we recommend the following numbering convention. Note that each Profile **must** have a unique IP address.

For the first profile, use 128.181.1.1
For the second profile, use 128.181.1.2
For the third profile, use 128.181.1.3
etc. ...

3. For the Subnet mask, use the same value on all systems: 255.255.255.0 and then click **OK**. Choose **Restart Now** from the resulting dialog box.
4. Power off and then reboot the Profile.
5. Verify TCP/IP connectivity between Profiles by opening a command prompt window and typing **ping 128.181.1.n** where n is the number for this Profile.
6. Repeat step 5 for at least one other Profile in the network.
7. Restart the Profile system when prompted.

NOTE: For more information on Windows NT networking please refer to one or more of the following:

NOTE: Use the procedure described in the following section to create an emergency repair disk after any software upgrade or any change of product configuration.



Creating an Emergency Repair Disk

NOTE: (1) The emergency repair disk is intended for trained service personnel to repair Windows NT if it is not operating properly. Repair data must be updated whenever the system configuration is changed. This includes software upgrades. Store the repair disk in a safe place for future use.

To make a new emergency repair disk, you need one 3.5" disk. Mark it clearly as the emergency repair disk for Profile system with serial number xxxxxxx. (You don't need to format the disk.)

NOTE: The emergency repair disk is system specific. Make sure that the emergency repair disk is clearly marked with its Profile system's serial number.

1. From the File menu, choose the **Run** command.
2. Enter **rdisk** in the Run dialog box.
3. Select the **Update Repair Disk** button.
4. Insert the floppy disk in the **A** drive and select **OK**. The utility then formats the disk and loads all of the information from the registry.
5. When the operation is complete, select the **Exit** button to leave the Repair Disk Utility.
6. Remove the Emergency Repair Disk from the Profile, set **WRITE PROTECT** on the disk, and store in a convenient location.
